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Background

- female labour force participation increase + a distinct gap between the regulatory regimes at the international and the domestic levels
- enhanced by different legal effects in implementation between international standards and domestic legislations
- A systemic research relating China's female labour protection is absent

- Based upon data and resources from China, the legal framework is placed down in relation with Chinese women workers' protection

Female Labour Force Participation

•A general increase of FLP in OECD in the 1980s and the 1990s Inequity: the trend started earlier in Nordic countries and the US •Contribution Factors: Education, Market Conditions, Cultural Attitudes, Policy Support (timing flexibility, child benefits, taxation preferences, parental care, etc.)

China's Reform

- Due to lasting political campaigns, the data is lack of FLP between 1949 and the second half of 1970s;
- \Box Since 1978, FLP has increased dramatically;
 - 67% FLP/Female Population ages 15+ (World Bank)
- During the restructuring adjustment in ownership and corporate governance since 1994, women were more vulnerable than men in the job market.


